

## **Alcohol Use Disorder Care Pathway**

#### **Assessment:**

In addition to a comprehensive physical evaluation, identification of comorbid conditions and mental health/suicide risk, assessment should include:

Risk Factors for Severe/Complicated Withdrawal: Include history of alcohol
withdrawal seizures or delirium, multiple prior withdrawal episodes, comorbid medical
illness (e.g. traumatic brain injury), age > 65, signs of autonomic hyperactivity,
physiological dependence on GABAergic agents

#### **Treatment:**

- The initial goals of treatment of alcohol use disorder should be agreed on between the patient and clinician.
- Use withdrawal assessment scale-triggered dosing rather than fixed schedule dosing, and longer half-life medications when possible. (ASAM)
- Care plan includes education, recommendations for medication for AUD, initiating medication for alcohol use disorder (MAUD) at the current level of care if possible and coordinating continuity of care. (American Psychiatric Association)

# **Support:**

Identify and list how the treatment team is addressing the needs of special populations such as (Surgeon General's Report):

- Adolescents
- Patients with medical comorbidities
- Pregnant women
- Geriatric patients
